The Rector Writes:-

Now slide part C into part B...

It sounded the easiest thing in the world, but after 45 minutes of trying to put the bed together, it was a lot harder than it sounded. The temptation to just give up was very strong! Often the easiest sounding things are not actually easy...



At the end of January it was a joy to have our friends from Tarporley Chapel join us for a special joint service to mark the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Revd Mark reminded us very powerfully of what our role is as the Church in Tarporley—we are to:

- \Rightarrow Love well
- \Rightarrow Preach the Gospel
- \Rightarrow Be one

As this edition of The Link lands through your door, we should be about to enter the season on Lent, preparing ourselves and souls before the joy and celebration of Easter. While we are often encouraged to 'give something up' for Lent, I wonder if perhaps we should instead return to Mark's words and make it our Lenten mission to put them into practice? Love well. Preach the Gospel. Be one. They sound easy to do, but putting them into practice is another thing!

To spend 40 days trying to love well: loving God, our neighbours, and even ourselves well. And not just say it, but really do it. Loving is hard! To spend 40 days preaching the good news of God: that love, forgiveness, mercy, hope are offered to all regardless of who they are and what they have done. This might be in what we say and do, the choices we make everyday. To spend 40 days being intentionally united with other believers: joining regularly to worship, or maybe even doing something different alongside other Christians (perhaps coming along to the session of *Refresh* on a Sunday evening at The Chapel, or taking up the challenge to read and discuss this year's Lent book, *The Whole Easter Story* on Friday mornings). Living up to the name of Christian is hard.

But better rather that we should try to do all those things than simply to give up....Sisters and brothers, let us not *give* up this Lent, but *live* up!

The Church of England's General Synod: Feb 2025

General Synod is the (largely elected) group who determine many of the rules and governance of the Church of England. Made up of Bishops, Clergy and Lay people, Synod gathers 2-3 times a year to make and revise policy and legislation. Much of this is uncontentious, but sometimes the work of Synod hits the news headlines. Key words at this group of sessions were "trust", "transparency", and "culture". The debates most picked up by the media this time were around the oversight and operation of the Church of England's safeguarding of children and vulnerable adults.

In the Diocese of Chester we are reliant on an army of Parish Safeguarding Officers - volunteers who ensure that we are following best policy and practice as we make churches as safe as they can be. They are supported by Diocesan Safeguarding Officers, who are paid professionals and incredibly skilled. Although PSOs and DSOs shape this work, safeguarding is all of our responsibility, and the question of how we take this forward was front and centre at Synod. Last year, Synod were offered four models for safeguarding. We rejected models 1 and 2 as not containing enough radical change. Models 3 and 4 are both radical. Both call for independent oversight of our safeguarding work: the creation of an external body which will hold us to account in this work and increase consistency across the Church of England.

Model 4 is more radical, because it also requires all of the Church's safeguarding professionals to be redeployed to an external charity, who will operate independently of the Church. This model is complex, and in the end Synod was unsure of whether it would be achievable without causing further harm to those who are most vulnerable. Instead, we settled on a "Model 3.5" – independent oversight followed by further work towards Model 4 – independent operation.

Of course, the reports of these debates in the press lacked nuance, and failed to reflect the thoughtfulness and prayer which was evidence through the debate, and the compassion and repentance which ran as a theme through these debates.

Nevertheless, as a church, we have failed, and sometimes continue to fail, the most vulnerable among us. The Diocese of Chester gets this more right than many other places, but there is no room for complacency. The work approved at Synod this week will take time to enact, perhaps years. Safeguarding remains all of our business – all of us have a responsibility to do better. At Synod we spent some time in prayer for those who have been harmed by the Church, and I ask you to join with me in continuing to pray for all who have experience church-based abuse, and those who care for them.

into your garden and planting some seeds. Did you know that the soil you choose to plant your seeds in can have wider impacts on the environment?

Why use peat free composts?

Peatlands are home to many species of plants and animals. They store carbon which is released when peat is harvested to be used in bags of compost. It renews at only 1mm per year and so peat is essentially a non-renewable resource. You can make an easy switch by choosing peat free compost. If we all choose to use it, we will reduce the demand for peat and so protect precious peatland habitats. All the garden centres offer peat free compost, and it is easy to spot PEAT FREE written on the bag.

How good are peat free composts?

Peat free composts have been refined over the years to provide a good growing medium for growing on and for mature plants. In the past there have been some reports of bad outcomes for seedlings in peat free compost but I think things have improved. I have had success with John Innes no.1 Peat Free. Why not give it a try and please let us all know how you get on?

Just One More Green Thing...


