The Rector Writes:-

Can you remember how were you feeling on Monday 17th of January? According to one psychologist Monday 17th January is the most depressing day of the year 2022, nicknamed 'Blue Monday'. Cliff Arnall deduced this from the following formula:



$$\frac{[W+D-d]T^Q}{MN_a}$$

Arnall calculated the date by using many factors, including weather conditions, debt level (the difference between debt accumulated and our ability to pay), time since Christmas, time since failing our new year's resolutions, low motivational levels and feeling of a need to take action. The outcome is that the third Monday of January is the most depressing day of the year. In many ways, it doesn't take a genius to realise that January can be a 'blue' time as it comes directly after the most celebratory and happy times of the year.

Although Christmas may seem like a distant memory, there should be something that lingers from the festive period — a sense of hope. Christmas reminds us that in the birth of Jesus, fully God and fully man, new hope entered the world. Hope that things could be different; hope that the God would intervene in human life in a new way, and this is continued into the season of Epiphany, as our Bible readings remind us of people who realised (or had an epiphany) of just who Jesus is. Even if the aroma of turkey and sprouts has long disappeared with the New Year, that sense of hope and a fresh start does not.

How does that help us with 'Blue Monday'? One of the points of the Epiphany season is to remind us that Jesus was God here on Earth, and that he went through all that we do, the joys and the sorrows, and can empathise with us in our situations. He promises that he will be with us and help us through the tough times. He also showed God to be engaging and caring for humanity: he had a plan for ordinary people and made them his disciples; he wanted people to rejoice and have fun, and ensured the wine didn't run out at the wedding; he came to bring fullness of life, which meant healing of bodies and minds. These three events illustrate that God offers us all new hope and new chances,

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regardless of the time of year, a great thing to remember as January comes to a close! And despite the lingering effects of the pandemic, there is still much to be hopeful about: new signs of life in our parish, new opportunities to engage with those around us, new ways to draw close to God, with Easter, the ultimate season of hope, just around the corner.

I wouldn't go as far as to agree with Wizzard that 'I wish it could be Christmas everyday', but perhaps we need to keep hold of its message of 'God with us' during the darkness of 'Blue Monday' and beyond. I pray that your January has not been too blue, and instead we can all look forward to a brighter and more colourful spring, where hope will abound. I'll leave you with some beautiful words on hope by the poet Emily Dickinson:

"Hope" is the thing with feathers - (314) - EMILY DICKINSON

"Hope" is the thing with feathers -That perches in the soul -And sings the tune without the words -And never stops - at all -

And sweetest - in the Gale - is heard -And sore must be the storm -That could abash the little Bird That kept so many warm -

I've heard it in the chillest land -And on the strangest Sea -Yet - never - in Extremity, It asked a crumb - of me.

Eco Church and our parish.

The PCC wants to take that commitment seriously by evaluating the ecological impact of the parish and its buildings in order to become an 'Eco-Church'. By surveying our Worship, Buildings, Land, Community engagement and Lifestyles we can assess what the parish can do to be more responsible good stewards of creation. Upon completing an online survey, our church buildings can be awarded a Bronze, Silver or Gold Eco-award, and work towards doing more!

'Paul for Everyone The Prison Letters' by Tom Wright

This book is part of a series of New Testament commentaries¹ written by Tom Wright, Research Professor of New Testament and Early Christianity at the University of St Andrews.

Observant readers will recall that one of his other books, a biography of Paul, was reviewed for 'The Link' by Julian in 2020. He is clearly one of the leading scholars at work today. And he writes very well.



I think it was the title of this book that got me interested, a bit like choosing a bottle of wine because the label looks appealing. It is the phrase 'for everyone' which did it. I find that Paul's letters, while full of the most beautiful, almost poetic writing about the Christian faith and how to live it, can be a bit dense and hard going in places. So I thought, perhaps this book can make them more accessible?

Does he succeed? Absolutely. Everything about this book has been designed to help us understand what Paul is driving at in these letters (Ephesians, Philippians, Colossians and Philemon), all written while he was in prison: he has made a completely new translation of each of them and broken them into short passages which are followed by a commentary which explains clearly and simply what they mean. Usually there is background information to help us understand the context and a modern day analogy to help the reader understand what Paul is saying. I found myself thinking 'Ah, that's what it means' quite a lot. And there were several places where the author drew attention to something quite profound that I'm sure I would have missed otherwise.

The combination of the new translation and the accessible commentary also seemed to bring me closer to Paul the man. You get a real sense of the emotions he must have felt as he was writing these letters while imprisoned and in chains. And yet 2000 years later we are still reading them!

If you feel like diving into Paul's letters in more depth then this book, or one of the others in the series, would make a good companion.
