Our Assistant Curate writes.....

Dear Friends,

In January's Link Magazine we included a piece about climate change and the Church of England's stated aim to become carbon neutral. It struck me that such an ambition speaks directly into the Anglican Communion's Five Marks of Mission, portrayed and listed below.



The Church believes that we each have an important role to play as part of God's Mission in the world. The church is to be a signpost to the reality of God's Kingdom and God's Kingdom Values. We are:

- 1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
- 2. To teach, baptise and nurture believers
- 3. To respond to human need by loving service
- 4. To transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
- 5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation, and sustain and renew the life of the earth



The five marks of mission were first developed by the Anglican Consultative Council in 1984. Since then, they have been widely adopted as an understanding of what contemporary mission is about. The marks were adopted by the General Synod in 1996 and many dioceses and other denominations have used them as the basis of action plans and creative mission ideas.

Some churches abbreviate the five marks to five words: TELL – TEACH – TEND – TRANSFORM – TREASURE.

Having looked at climate change and attempts to safeguard creation with one member of our congregation last month, I have been speaking to some more members of our church family who are actively engaged in the reality of the 5 Marks of Mission, this time in the area of number 4, transforming unjust structures of society, expressed above as responding in loving service.

On page 8 is a summary of an interview I had with Fiona and Martin Buck about their role as Waterways Chaplains. I hope you find their answers to my questions as humbling and motivating as I did.

Lent and Lent Groups

In February we entered the season of Lent and we would normally be



enjoying some fabulous soup, hospitality, learning and discussion in our Lent groups. This year is of course different for we are still not able to meet in person. I have therefore decided to host an on-line Lent Book Club as we did in Advent. The book I have chosen is called "Living His Story", and is written by Hannah Steele, a lecturer of mine from theological college. 

Julian's discussion with Martin and Fiona Buck relating their role as Waterways Chaplains to area four of the 'Five Marks of mission'

Julian:

I remember very well the commissioning service in St Helens back in November 2018, remind me briefly how you came to be Waterways Chaplains?

Martin & Fiona: As you know, first and foremost we are both Christians, and have been on the



canal network for many years. We knew of a boater on our moorings who needed pastoral support but whilst we were members of the Boaters Christian Fellowship (BCF), we didn't know how we could best help her. They say God moves in mysterious ways and literally a few weeks later we were on the Oxford Canal, saw a Chaplain walking the towpath and spoke to him once he had dealt with a boater in need. He signposted us to the organisation and after a call with the Lead Chaplain we agreed to put theory into practice, and signed up to train as Waterways Chaplains. All you need is to be a Christian, to be able to give several hours a week and to own a good pair of wellies to walk a mile (or more) of your designated towpath.

You are expected to be sponsored by your local church (ours being St. Helens) and undergo DBS checks and have three referees, who are prepared to support any applications. All Chaplains undergo a Probationary period of training prior to licensing that normally ranges from 6 to 12 months, our training took a year prior to our commissioning.

Julian: How have things changed over the last three- and a-bit years since you joined?

Martin & Fiona: The biggest change is that when we started as Chaplains, there were only 4 covering every canal north of Birmingham, over a thousand miles of waterways. Happily, the Chaplaincy has grown and we have established northern regional hubs in Staffordshire, Lancashire, the North Midlands, and Yorkshire with around 30 Chaplains now walking the towpath regularly. Perception of the Chaplaincy has also grown within the boating community and referrals now come to us from the Canal & River Trust, the Police, Churches, Social Services as well as other boaters!!!

The number of problem cases we deal with are multiplying annually and we are witnessing more deprivation from all walks of life. For example, demographics show that the growth in single ex Service males becoming boat owners is the principal area of greatest need. There are more and more people buying boats to live on due to the current economic situation and the increase in this category of boater is becoming a serious concern to the authorities. The common denominator is that people do not understand the logistics of owning a boat, thinking that it a cheaper alternative to housing, not appreciating the need for expensive and regular maintenance. Julian: One of the Church of England's Five marks of mission is "to seek to transform unjust structures of society".

Could you share maybe three unjust structures that the chaplaincy organisation is trying to transform?

Fiona & Martin: The number one issue for any boater who is a continuous cruiser, is that they don't have a postcode or a registered address. So, if their health fails, they cannot receive even basic healthcare from a GP surgery without a postcode. The Chaplaincy is working locally with Healthwatch Cheshire in a pilot study for the NHS to encourage all Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCG's) to acknowledge the pitfalls experienced by boaters and to offer training and guidance to all G.P. practices to manage registration of patients without a postcode. Also, the Emergency Services are being encouraged to adopt the **"WHAT 3 WORDS"** system that splits the entire globe into uniquely named 3m squares to act as reference points in times of rescue and response.

Second, any application for, say Universal Credit, also fails at the first hurdle through lack of a postcode which triggers a blunt rebuttal of any application. We have encountered several local authorities with this mind set and we are trying to develop a level of understanding that will enable valid applications to proceed effectively.

Third, the process behind boat ownership and compliance to licencing requirements is unregulated and open to abuse. We have encountered people who have bought a boat for cash, with no system of checks or guarantees. In two cases the boats sank within hours! In others, only after the money had changed hands did the need for extensive repairs become clear.

Julian: What have been your highlights? It all sounds a bit of an uphill struggle (if you can push water uphill that is!)

Martin & Fiona: That's what locks are for!! Seriously though, highlights are the fellowship of the Chaplaincy, prayerful support within our group and the enrichment of those boaters we have been able to help and support. One example of many is that we were recently able to house a 77-year-old boater, who had fallen ill. Thanks to the wonderful teams at Shropshire Well-being and Wrekin Housing Trust, we were able to get this gentleman into safe and warm

surroundings after he had spent 19 years aboard his boat which was rotting away around him, and all within just six weeks of being contacted by him. When we met him, he said he was definitely a non-believer. Now he has turned back to God and says that he prays regularly for us. Truly humbling, and so uplifting!

We consider ourselves very fortunate to be involved with the boating fraternity that has welcomed the work of Chaplains with gusto and warmth. So much so that we were jointly nominated by the community for a Team of the Year Award. Having been short-listed into the final four, we were awarded a Commendation by the Adjudication Committee, and we were delighted to receive this accolade on behalf of all at Waterways Chaplaincy.

Julian: What lessons would you say you have learned along the way?

Fiona & Martin: Whilst the majority of our cases have had positive outcomes, there have been times when we have perhaps grown too close to boaters. Not all facts can be taken at face value and discernment is the overriding lesson that any Chaplain needs to practice. In particular, we have learned to seek help and guidance from others. Our ministry is only as strong as the team delivering it. At times we have sought strength and support within the Chaplaincy and importantly those at St. Helens where Georgina, Julian and Trevor have all emphasised that we cannot take on the world without the Lord or the body of the Church and the Chaplaincy being supporting us.

We have realised that what we do is not for us or humankind, but for the glory of God

Julian: Is there anything more that we as your church family could be doing to help?

Martin & Fiona: Please pray for the work of the Chaplaincy. We have often wondered if some individuals would be willing to join a kind of Prayer Link or Chain to cascade specific prayer requests out to the congregations of Tarporley?

Like all charities we need financial support. Our parent body is Workplace Matters and inevitably their work is constrained by funding at times. On a local level, it is important to be able to provide food, fuel or clothing at short notice, o local benefactors would be good. (Continued overleaf)

Julian: Could you tell us maybe three things we could be praying for?

Fiona & Martin:

- Pray that, as it says in Micah 6:8, we continue to Act Justly, Love Mercy and Walk humbly with our God.
- That we can continue to reach out to those in need as we remember we are Christ's hands and feet.
- 3. That with the help and support of others the Chaplaincy can grow in both numbers and strength. Boating is not always the sanctuary that people believe it to be. Hardship, poverty, loneliness, well-being, and mental health issues all need



signposting. The demand for growth A bookmark/Prayer Card for Boaters within the Chaplaincy is uppermost in our prayers.

Julian: Last question... What does it take to become a Waterways Chaplain?

Fiona & Martin: You do not have to be a boat owner. Just be able to walk a mile a week on the towpath to get to know your "patch". You also need to be able to devote some time each week. Please look at the Chaplaincy Website: www.waterwayschaplaincy.org.uk for more information.
